15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The college curriculum is both interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary. The students of a particular subject in Social science, Arts, Science, Commerce and BCA have to choose general elective as interdisciplinary subject in 5th and 6th semesters. In addition, in 3rd and 4th semesters the students have to opt for multidisciplinary subjects such as students of Arts, Commerce, BCA can opt for ability enhancement course – Environmental Science and Disaster Management and skill courses such as sericulture.

17. Skill development:

The college has inbuilt skill courses in 3rd and 4th semesters for Arts, Social Science, Science and Commerce students. In addition, the college also started two additional skill courses with the financial support of HED of J&K as industrial skill courses. One was in Self Employed Tailoring, and the other in Mobile Repairing. Both the courses were run in collaboration with National Skill Development Corporation of India. MoUs were signed with two relevant Skill Sector Councils of the NSDC for running these courses. A total of 23 students were given tailoring training, and another 20 mobile repairing training.

18. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Integration of Indian Knowledge system is part of curriculum in various subjects of Social Science and Arts in the college. For example the subject of History looks in to different aspects of India history. Social Work analyses the welfare system of India, indigenous social work practices of India. Political Science teaches students about the Indian constitution, different traditional and modern institutional systems. Subjects of Arts such as Kashmiri, Urdu, English and Persian, reflect on literary aspect of Indian knowledge.

The celebration of Matribhasha Diwas and exchanges through EBSB Club are also celebration of Indian knowledge, culture, tradition and historical system.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The college offers Outcome Based Education in Undergraduate Courses which leads to Degrees of Bachelors of Arts, Science, Commerce and BCA. The program outcomes, program specific outcomes and the course outcomes are posted on the college website, college digital notice board, besides they are intimated to the students in the classroom. The teachers get introduced to them in the academic meetings held at the beginning of every session.

Biotechnology

- The syllabus is designed to cater to the needs of students studying Biotechnology. The course is regarded as a buffet table with something for everyone. It is ultimately upon the student to do appropriate self-service and enjoy the menu.
- Biotechnology is a good major course to choose, as it equips students with transferable skills and its implications in health, medical, diagnostic, environment, industry etc.
- On completion of the course students are able to have knowledge on biomolecules, their importance, classification and properties.
- It enables students to describe the biophysical techniques for the isolation, identification and quantification of biomolecules.

Part B

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Our College is affiliated with the University of Kashmir, and it follows the University's prescribed curriculum. The Annual Academic Calendar is prepared according to the University Calendar by the IQAC to ensure proper teaching-learning process and the same is made available on the College Website. Academic Monitoring Committee regularly monitors the faculty progress on different component of curriculum. Meetings are held throughout the year to review progress and discuss the course of action for upcoming sessions. Every department prepares a teaching plan to be taught. For information, the updated syllabus copies of each subject are distributed among students. Some Professors maintain a personal diary for effective academic planning, implementation, and review of the curriculum. Theory & Practical classes are held according to the timetable. Conventional classroom teaching is blended with reasonable use of ICT to make the teaching-learning process more learner-centric. 2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Student centric methods are of pivotal importance in enhancing the learning experiences. We believe that unless students are made central figures, entire learning processes will prove futile. In this spirit the college follows experimental learning, participative learning and problem solving methods to engage students in the learning process and thereby enhance their abilities. College arranges group based and individual mentoring for students wherein they are counselled with the primary objective of minimizing drop out cases, enhancing student attendance and interest in classes, while analysing their academic and personal problems.

Due to COVID-19 the teaching-learning processes was conducted online. Teachers developed a bond with the students and remained in touch with them through e-mails and other learning applications. Active participation of students is always part of the learning process through -group discussions and student presentations.

As part of experimental learning the college organizes various study tours of different subject to specific fields. Unfortunately, this year none of the subject tour was conducted due to COVID19. However, during a short window of when COVID19 lockdown was relaxed students were exposed to experimental learning process through participation in plantation under plantation and cleanliness drive. Our institution has been using ICT since its inception. However, it has received a momentum in the year 2020-21 when world in general and J&K in particular was under the restrictions due to COVID-19. The restrictions for offline education gave birth to the exploration of ICT. 2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

The introduction of Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) has brought with itself a new method of evaluation, with 2 credit weightage being given to the internal assessment in a 6-credit course. So, in addition to practicals and internal examination of practical in science subjects, all other subjects are also conducting internal examinations through different forms. This includes marks weightage to the attendance and continuous class-based performance, assignments, class presentation, MCQs and vivas. Since the year was predominantly under online teaching virtual modes such as WhatsApp, Google classrooms, WiseApp, Zoom, and email-based applications were used for internal assessments. In some cases where MCQs based tests were used students could see the results immediately after the submission of test. Academic Monitoring Committee and examination committee devised the system for internal examination, and same was monitored by both the committees. If any grievances emerged they were referred to and addressed by the Grievance Redresser Committee.

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

The students are oriented in the start of session. In this session the students are provided with the necessary details about the mechanism and procedure of the examination and grievance system - filing and redressal. During classwork teachers address the class-based questions/grievances of students related to internal examinations or any other matter.

If any student has an issue with the internal assessment - after submission/late submission/non reflection of internal assessment results in final grades, they are given a patient hearing. When a

complaint is filed Examination and Grievance Redressal Committee holds a meeting to decide the merit of each case. The concerned head of the department is called to look into the grievances of students within a stipulated period of time. The aggrieved students are provided the answer scripts by the concerned faculty member if there is a demand and need. In case there is any discrepancy in tabulation, it is immediately looked into and rectified based on merit of the case. Moreover, the answer scripts are cross checked, if needed, to satisfy the students. However, in case students suffer from some issue like writing coherently in the examination, the teacher arranges special sessions for them to improve their performance.

The College was established in the year 2005 and is spread over 58 kanals. The institution ensures adequate availability and optimal utilization of physical infrastructure as it is critically linked to the mission and vision of the college.

To cater to the ever-increasing student strength the college has always taken proactive steps to provide various facilities to develop the infrastructure in the campus in terms of classrooms, laboratories and infrastructure for sports, extra and co-curricular activities.

The institution has 21 Class Rooms with Digital Interactive Panels (LEDs) and a smart classroom/seminar hall. The library has a rich and varied collection of books. The college library is well equipped with computer systems with SOUL catalogue and a Photostat machine as well as a printer. The college has rich internet facilities and most of the departments are well equipped with computers, printers and internet facilities. The college has recently acquired the solar power plant of 50 KVA giving 24x7 power backup, 2 diesel Gensets of 63 KVA and 40 KVA ensuring power back up to the entire campus. The IQAC of the college has contributed significantly in institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes during the academic year, some of the noteworthy initiatives are as following:

a) By framing the Academic Monitoring Committee, IQAC has assured that academics of the college is taken care. Review of teaching learning process, structures and methodologies at periodical intervals is one of the key tasks of IQAC in our college, and this is done with the support of College admissions, academic monitoring, and examinations committees. Some of the initiatives taken during the year which reflected incremental improvement in teaching and learning process and evaluation are as following:

1. As reflected earlier technological innovation, with the installing of smart boards in 8 classrooms has improved teaching methodology as teachers are now using the power point presentation, documentaries,

graphic representation, three-dimensional visualization of things like cell organelles. This multidimensional teaching process has improved the interest, attention, experience of learning among students.

2. Since online teaching was going on for a number of months during the academic year due to COVID19, the IQAC with the help of other committees tried to streamline the process by enrolling all students on Google classroom, recording teachers' lectures and making them available on either YouTube or Google classroom. WASTE MANAGEMENT

The GDC, Beerwah has taken major initiatives for waste management by implementing solid waste management plan in the campus. The waste is segregated into biodegradable and non-biodegradable components and is stored in color coded dust bins kept in different departments/canteen office and corridors The Burning of leaves, vegetal waste and general waste is totally banned within the campus to maintain carbon neutrality and are converted into organic compost

Liquid waste management: Waste water from is separated into black and grey wastewater. The black wastewater is directed to separate drainage network to avoid contamination whereas grey water flows through a separate drainage network is collected and stored in tanks near rainwater harvesting tank and is subsequently used for irrigation purposes in the campus. The waste water generated from laboratories during practical hours is collected in a separate tank and is discharged on a clay bed to avoid contamination of surface and groundwater.

E-Waste management: E-waste corner has been set up inside the physics laboratory with the support of MCB where the college e-waste are collected from time to time. Awareness is generated among the students, teachers and the non-teaching staff to dump their personal e-waste into the bin.

7.2 - Best Practices

7.2.1 - Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual.

Solar Power Plant Installation: Since our college is located in a rural area, it had less electricity supply. The erratic electricity supply was impeding the effective teaching learning and administrative processes. In this back-drop the College Development Committee (CDC) planned to install a solar power plant. The CDC approached to the Department of Higher Education Govt. of J&K with a proposal, with continuous follow-up the project was sanctioned and solar plant was installed. Now all the buildings, labs and departments are provided with uninterrupted solar power supply that showed significant positive changes in delivering effective teaching learning and administrative practices.

Water Secure and Sustainable Campus: Beerwah town has least developed water supply infrastructure, which leads to frequent public protests. This was affecting the college campus as well, with insanitary and unhygienic washrooms and lack of water for laboratories. To address the issue the CDC decided to make college campus water secure and sustainable. In consultation with District Administration experts a 200-meter-deep bore well was constructed, and rainwater from rooftops was harvested. This led to significant changes in the college campus – continuous supply of water for washrooms and gardens; recharging of ground water and extended green cover; and no stress on public water distribution system.

Bringing technology into the classroom teaching

ICT enabled teaching and learning has been one of the key focus of the Higher Education Department of J&K. One of the key agendas in this direction has been bringing technology to classrooms thereby moving away from the traditional ways of teaching. One of the distinctive steps GDC Beerwah took in this direction for the first time since its inception, was introduction of smartboards in classrooms.

In the first experiment eight Interactive Smart boards were installed in eight classrooms. These installations have changed the nature of teaching as well as learning. For teachers it has made teaching artistic – with access to different IT tools in every lecture – switching between smart pen-based writing, to PPTs to documentaries as and when needed. Showing instruments, diagrams, pictures in 3-dimensional setting, especially in Science subjects.

For learners it has made learning process creative and more engaging. Students have also got a chance to move away from traditional whiteboard-based presentation and use of smartboards for giving their class presentations.

Moreover, this has not only enhanced IT skills of faculty members but also of the students.
